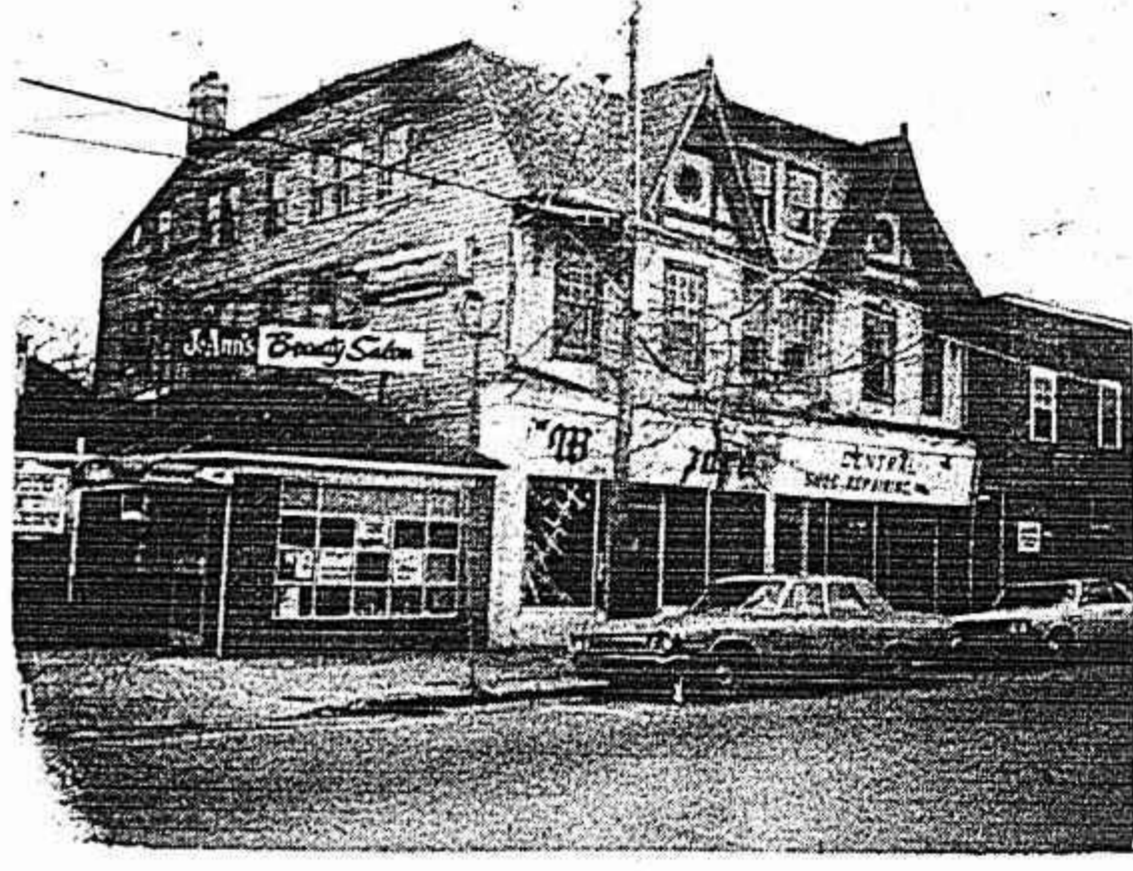

**TOWN TAKES ACTION**--The Islip Town Board this week initiated action against a deteriorated structure on Railroad Avenue near Center Street in Sayville. The owner, of the structure, Mrs. Millie Librizzi of Versa Place, Sayville, according to town officials, is to be notified by registered letter that certain conditions at the building, at 5460 Railroad Avenue, are in violation of the Islip Town Fire Prevention Code and must be corrected. These include the need for a general cleanup at the site, securing building windows to prevent further entry and vandalism, the removal or securing of leaders and gutters in front of the building and the removal of existing stucco that is now falling away from the building. These problems, town officials point out, have existed for at least the last four years. If the owner fails to comply with the request, a summons will be served and litigation would follow. Much concern has been expressed by residents of this area concerning the conditions at the building and the threat it poses for a possible fire, which would endanger adjoining structures.

## Admiral William Sessions, Resident of Oakdale, Dies

Rear Admiral William A. Sessions (USN RET.) died at the Northport Veterans Administration Hospital December 16 at the age of 76.

Born in New York City, he had lived in Oakdale for over 15 years. He was a veteran of both World Wars, and had risen to become Commodore of the North Atlantic and the North Atlantic Task Commander during World War II. He was a member of the VFW, Retired Officer's Assoc., Navy League, American Legion, and was a charter member of the 2nd Battalion N.M.N.Y.

## Town Board Cancels Change of Zone Meet

Because of the lingering problem of power blackouts in certain parts of the town, a new storm sard to be on the way, and the hurried holiday season, the Islip Town Board yesterday cancelled a scheduled public hearing on a number of change of zone applications, including one in this local area on the town board's own motion.

That proposal would consider the change of zone from General Service D to Business I on land located on the north side of Montauk Highway and west of Rollstone Avenue, West Sayville, which had been the proposed site of a MacDonald's hamburger restaurant. The Town Board of Appeals had approved the extension of business use into residential area for parking purposes for the proposed MacDonald's use. However, two officials declared the location not suitable for a drive-in hamburger restaurant, citing current neighboring uses and traffic hazards as their reasons, and changed the zoning of the land from business to general service use. This prevented the construction of a restaurant on the site.

The town now, however, is considering the restoration of the business use zoning. New legislation on town books which would require special town board permission for drive-in restaurant construction eliminates the problem of the past, a town spokesman said.

## Committee Proposals Delivered to Board

The Sayville Board of Education received a preliminary report from the Citizens Communications Advisory Committee at the Board meeting of December 13. The committee, established by the board to review communications between the schools and the community and to make recommendations for improving communications, included eight recommendations in the report. The preliminary report was made at this time since the recommendations were determined to have budget implications. The recommendations are as follows:

1. Substantially improve communications by such means as producing more and expanded editions of "News of Your Schools" to include information on such topics as curriculum plans, report cards, budget, innovative programs, psychological services, guidance services and BOCES programs.
2. Produce and distribute a curriculum handbook which would describe the various courses and programs in the schools.
3. Continually strengthen the reading program at all levels.
4. Make provisions for the complete program of Interscholastic athletic activities for girls.
5. Strengthen our guidance services to include an additional counselor at both the junior and senior high school level.
6. Expand the curriculum to include more opportunities for
