Herr was sleeping in the quarters known as Provisional Recruits Barracks No. 2, in which the fire started. Corp. Donald Ivory, in the same barracks, was awakened from his sleep by the door of an overheated stove breaking off and showering the wooden building with live coals. He awakened his comrades and the barracks were quickly cleared of their occupants. Shots from a sentry's rifle aroused the post

Herr was helping his mates fight the blaze with buckets of water when he recalled that his marriage license was in the barracks with his belongings. Two or three non-commissioned officers tried to restrain him from running back into the flaming barracks, but were pushed aside. The fire spread rapidly, and Herr was not seen until his charred body was found in the ruins of the blace an hour later.

Col. Edward Croft, Post Commandant, estimated, the loss at several thousand dollars, and said that a Board of Inquiry would investigate the cause of the fire.
