

Patrolman Patrick S. Hanley.

A requiem mass will be celebrated tomorrow morning in the Holy Name R. C. Church for a Patrolman Patrick S. Hanley, known as "Daredevil" Hanley, who died on Saturday at his home, 400a Prospect avenue. The police band, the Hero's Legion of the Police Department and a squad of men from the Hamilton avenue station, to which he was formerly attached, will attend. The interment will followed in Holy Cross Cemetery. The indirect cause of the policeman's death is attributed to a bullet wound he recived on July 8, 1912, when he was shot in the back while trying to capture a man who had shot a brother officer. He was in the hospital for eight months. Patrolman Hanley was fifty years old. He joined the police force twenty-five years ago and was assigned to the Hamilton avenue station. The district was, then noted for its rough element and the young officer had many narrow escapes. After he recovered from the bullet wound, he was assigned to easier duty at the Municipal Lodging House, Manhattan. Surviving are his wife, Mary E.; two sons, William and Daniel, and four daughters, Ella, Lillian, aMe and Loretta.
