he town. The rebels made a demand on the colonlsts 20 miles away for three wagon-loads of corn. The Americans refused the request. A notice was sent by the rebel leader that he would send a detachment of men to seize the corn and sign a re-ceipt. The colonists replied that they would fight before they would give up.

Preparations for defense have been made by the colonists. Sentinels are posted to watch for the rebels, and the schoolhouse bell will be rung as a signal of danger. There are about 100 Americans in the two colonies, and all are well

armed.

Conditions in Some Cities.

In Cleveland, Ohio; Cambridge, Mass. Boston, Mass.: Milwankee, Wis and To-Boston, Mass.; Milwarkee, Wis., and To-ledo, Ohlo, the members of the Retail Merchants' Association must be mem-bers of the chamber of commerce, board of trade, or whatever the parent organi-zation may be. This is the way the two bodies are operated in this city. In Mil-waukee, where the merchants belong to both organizations, there are no extra dues, and thus it does not become burensome on the merchants.
Thirteen of the cities from which com-

munications have been received stated that the retail merchants' association was in no way connected with the cham ber of commerce, and nine of the cities, including Baltimore, stated that they did not have retail merchants' associa-

No comparison can be drawn as yet, as ommunications have been received from omparatively few cities. 
