KINGSTON, N. H., July 6—Former State Senator Levi S. Bartlett, for many years a leading figure in Rockingham County Republican politics, died today at his home at the age of 83. He was born here, the son of Levi S. and Caroline Sanborn Bartlett, and had been a life-long resident of the town which he had served as a town officer, representative to the General Court, 1900-10, and the Senate, 1925-26. He was a grandson of Josiah Bartlett, a signer of the Declaration of Independence.

He leaves a widow, Mrs. R. Grace Bartlett, and two daughters, Mrs. Rodney Wilson of New Rochelle, N. Y., and Mrs. Ralph Goodrich of Epping, N. H.

THOMAS A. M'BREARTY

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YONKERS, N. Y., July 6—Thomas A. McBrearty died here last night at his home, 21 Mile Square Road, after an illness of six months, at the age of 35. He was export manager for Henry Heide, Inc., candy manufacturers, New York, with which he had been associated since 1920. A former Grand Knight of the San Salvador Council, Knights of Columbus, he was a member of the governing board of the New York Council, K. of C.

Two brothers, Charles J. and Laurence McBrearty of Yonkers, survive.

GEORGE T. SHERIDAN

George T. Sheridan of 2420 Glenwood Road, Brooklyn, who retired in 1934 as a police lieutenant after forty-four years on the force, died Friday in the Holy Family Hospital, Brooklyn, at the age of 71. Appointed Brooklyn's first traffic sergeant in 1905, he advanced to lieutenant in 1916.

He leaves a widow, Elizabeth; a son, Edward, and a brother, Edward Sheridan.

PHILADELPHIA, July 6 (AP)—Frank Bruce of Memphis, Tenn., vice president of the E. L. Bruce Company, collapsed while walking along a downtown street yesterday. He died a short time later in Hahnemann Hospital. His age was 55. Coroner Charles H. Hersch said the cause of death was a cerebral hemorrhage.
