Hints From Heloise By HELOISE CRUSE

Dear Heloise: Here is a wonderful idea for those who sew: Take the red strip from a package of cigarettes and a piece of cellophane tape a little longer than the strip. Place the red strip carefully down the center of the sticky side of the tape.

Measure five-eighths of an inch (the usual seam allowance when sewing) to the right of the hole that your sewing machine needle goes into.

Lay the center of the red cellophane strip on this mark and extend it straight up and down from this point.

Then cover completely again with more tape, making sure that the strip stays parallel with the side of the machine all the way.

Do this job very carefully and the little strip will stay on your machine for years.

Now, isn't that tricky? And lots of us oldsters, or those who wear bifocals or glasses, can see the red strip more easily! I also caution you girls to be careful when applying that little red strip.

If the tape shrinks, gets dry, or looks like it is deteriorating around the edges, for goodness sake, tear it off and replace it.

Dear Heloise: My daughter has a metal wardrobe cabinet for her clothes. When she asked for a handy pin cushion for her hangers and other pins, I put a magnetized metal clamp inside the door and clamped a piece of foam rubber in its grip.

This instant pin cushion could also be attached to a sewing machine.

I am an arthritic cripple, and I am unable to pick up things which have been dropped to the floor.

I had the man of the house (my brother) bend a wire clothes hanger to form a long handle. The hook at the end of the hanger will grab objects which have fallen to the floor.

I also use one of these bent hangers as an aid in dressing myself, so I keep one hanger in the bedroom.

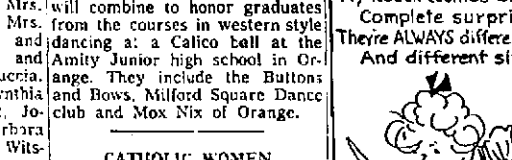

Vividly colored blue and green parrot fish lie down and roll over to be picked clean of parasites by swarms of tiny multi-colored fish named wrasse.

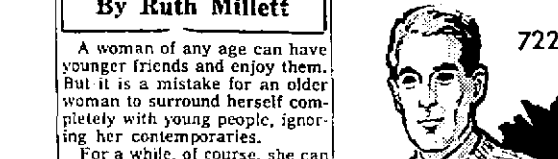

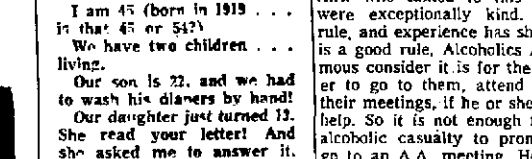
MEDAL HONORS BANTU PRETORIA
