## Business of September Term Fluished and Court Adjourned,

Thomas Condos, who conducted a candy store in this city and who was arrested for keeping open his store on Sunday, was put on trial before Judge William L. Bennett and a jury in the superior criminal court yesterday. He was defended by James J. Quinn and Samuel C. Kone, and State's Attorney Hugh M. Alcorn prosecuted. The jury was out about ten minutes and reported a verdict of guilty, Judge Bennett imposed a fine of \$25 and costs on the accused.

The other Sunday store openers who had been arrested for the offense then entered pleas of guilty and were each fined \$25 and costs. They were Arthur King, Gustavis Condos, George Cramer and James Tranti Polorias.

James Condos is now out of the state and Mr. Quinn said he yould be in court at the next term, and the case against W. H. H. Musson, a Windsor drugglist, charged with keeping open on Sunday, was continued to the next term of the court.

James If. Warner, charged with failing to support his wife, gave a bond to provide her \$3,50 a week for six months.

Jennie Delfoney, charged with theft from the person, entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to juli for one year,

Michael Cannon, charged with entering a railroad car, was sentenced to jail for six months.

Howard Campbell, a minor, for burglary, was sentenced to fall for two years.

John Grill and Peter Hesemah, charged with burghary at Max Roth's saloon, were each sentenced to juli for one year on pleas of guilty.
